

Straw (straw)

Straw is the stems of dried wheat or other grains. It can be used to build houses and keep them warm.

Stilt (stilt)

A *stilt* is a post used to hold up a building above water. Many stilts are used to hold up buildings.

Addition

(ad·di·tion)

Addition is the process of adding something to something else. In math, numbers are added together. When people are talking or writing they sometimes connect ideas together by saying “in addition.”

For example:

Few trees grow near the North Pole. In *addition*, rocks are hard to get to under the snow. Because there are no trees, and rocks are hard to get to, people live in igloos made of ice.
