

(E·con·o·my)

Definition: The way that money, businesses and products are organized in a particular country, area, etc.

(gran·ite)


Definition: a very hard natural igneous rock formation Example: The Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial is made of white *granite*.








Graphite (graph·ite)





(Min·er·al)



Renewable

(re·new·a·ble)

Definition: Something that is able to be replaced by natural processes so that it is never used up.


Example: Cows always produce milk, which makes them a great *renewable* resource for humans.

Definition: Something such as land, mineral, or natural energy that exists in a country and can be used in order to increase its wealth **Example:** Trees are a natural *resource* that humans use to make paper.
