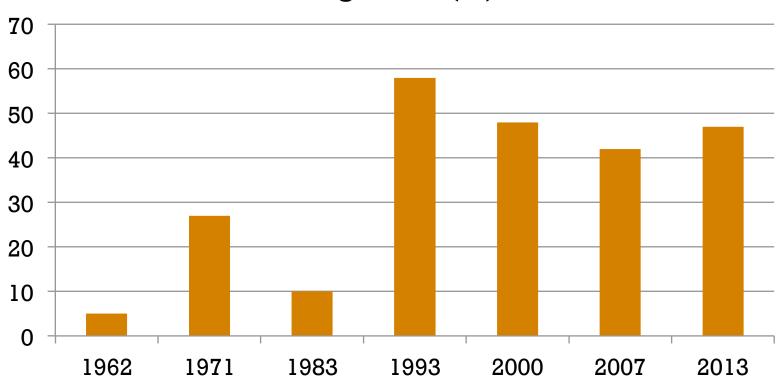
### Length of Words





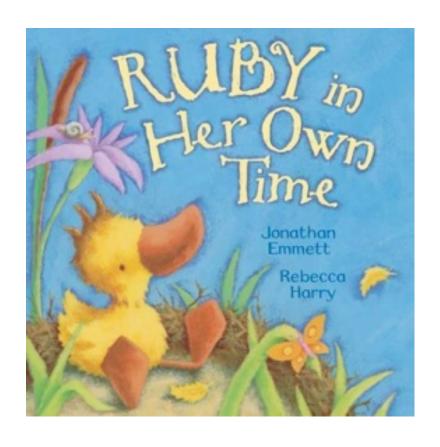
### Percentage of Singletons



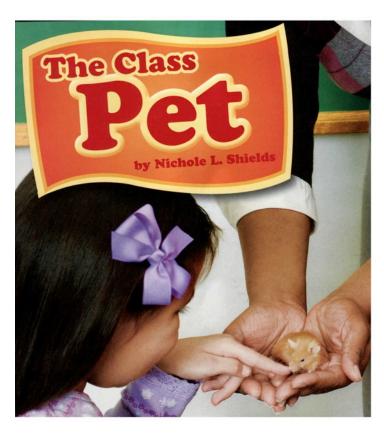

The storm was getting close.

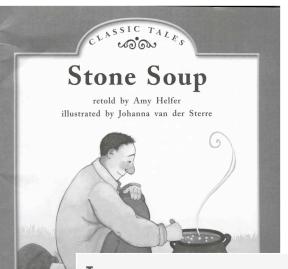

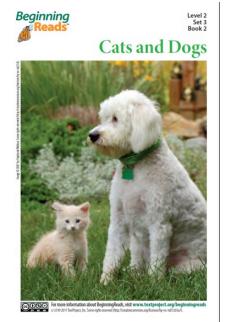
# Begin with concrete words (that are also phonetically regular & highly frequent)

Cats are little. Dogs are little.



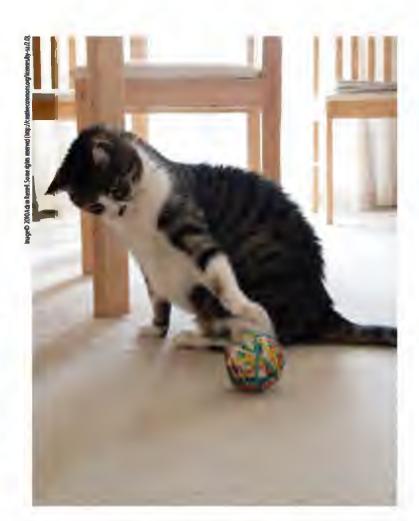

Ensure that texts are sequenced to attend to patterns and repetitions of words

■Not a phoneme-based curriculum that measures whether phonemes have been taught (i.e., Lesson to Text Match (LTTM)): The assumption here has been that students will develop automaticity with many different exemplars of phonemes and with a single lesson on a phoneme.



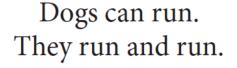

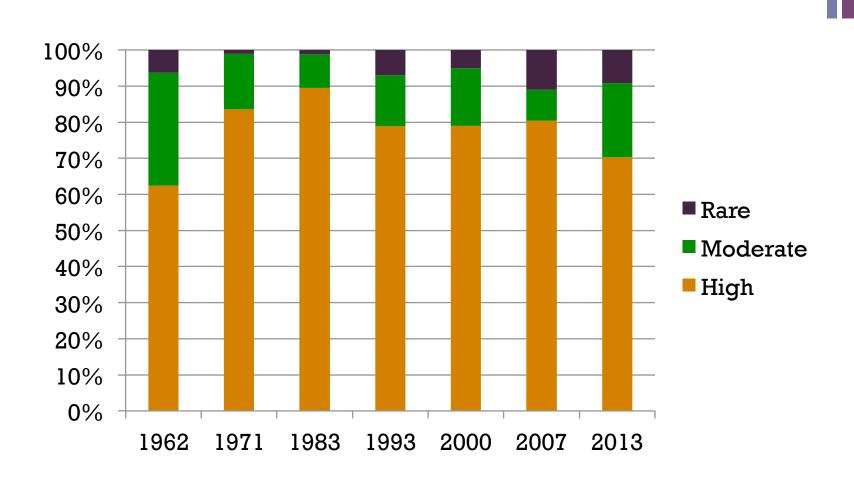
# + Distribution of Words in Written English

families (e.g., helpless,
helpful + simple members)
