#### Kites: Dancers in the Wind



You're on a beach, and the wind is blowing off the ocean. Your kite floats and swirls, dancing in the wind.

Kites were invented in China more than 2,000 years ago. They were first used by the Chinese military, but about 1,000 years ago, people started flying kites for fun. Since then, kites have been used for celebrations, in competitions, and

for science. In addition, kite festivals show off the many shapes and colors of kites. These festivals are held in Japan, Pakistan, and many other countries.

The first kites were made of silk. After paper was invented, around the year 100 AD, people used it to make kites. Today, most kites are made of paper or cloth, with sticks to hold them in shape and string to hold onto them. However, there are also kites for skiing or for moving a buggy on a beach.

In ancient times, kites carried lines across rivers. These lines helped build bridges. In the 1880s, kites



were first used to take photographs. In the early 1900s, the United States Weather Bureau used kites to help with weather prediction. The kites measured winds and temperatures.

The word kite is from an Old English word that means "a kind of hawk." Kites were probably given this name because of the way they look when they fly.

To fly a kite, find a large open area, such as a park or a beach. Make sure there are no trees or power lines the kite can get caught on. Then hold the kite's string up and run. The kite will lift when it catches the wind. Guide your kite by pulling the string. Make sure you look around when you're running so you don't run into anything.

As you watch the kite, notice how it moves. If the wind is just right, your kite will dance, too, swirling as

the wind takes it high up into the sky.





#### Putting Two Words Together



A lot of sports that people play use balls. In basketball, players try to get a ball through a hoop. In baseball, players use a bat to hit a ball. In football, players throw a ball to get it close to the goal.

There are other words with "ball" that describe things that are round. But they are not balls with which you play a game. Meatballs are not used in any sport. But

they are great with spaghetti.

Eyeballs help in playing sports. But there isn't a sport called eyeball where teams throw and catch eyeballs. You wouldn't want to be in a game that uses fireballs. If you would ever see a fireball, you should get as far away as fast as you can. Then call 911 right away. You should also watch out if a cannonball is going to be fired. It is round but you don't want to play with a cannonball. You especially do not want to catch a cannonball!

There are some words, though, that have ball in them but it has nothing to do with round. Ballpoint pens make



writing a lot easier. It's easy to see how the "point" got into ballpoint pen. But why the ball? That part is in the name because of the tip of a pen is round. There are also rooms that are called ballrooms. People hold balls in ballrooms but they aren't the round kind.

Other words with ball have nothing to do with round. In these words, the "ball" part of the word is not even said the same as ball in baseball or meatball. Ballerina is not ball with "erina." Ballerinas are dancers and the word has nothing to do with ball. A ballot is used by people to vote but it is not round. You don't even say "ball" when you say the word ballot.

Whenever you see ball as part of a word, look carefully. Usually, the word has something to do with games and sports. But remember eyeballs, fireballs, and cannonballs. These balls may be round but they aren't

#### A Birthday Wish: Rachel Beckwith



In the summer of 2011, Rachel Beckwith had just finished third grade. She was looking forward to riding her bike and playing games like jump rope with her friends. Rachel also liked dancing.

Then she heard someone say that there were children in Africa who did not have clean water to drink. The person was from an organization called

charitywater.org, a charity that builds wells for towns in Africa. The wells provide people with clean water. Without wells, people often have to walk many miles to find water, then carry it home in buckets. Often, the water is not clean.

Instead of presents for her ninth birthday, Rachel asked her family and friends to donate \$9 for clean water in Africa to charitywater.org. If she could raise \$300, 15 people could get clean drinking water.

By the time her birthday came, Rachel had raised \$220. That meant that 11 people could get clean water.

She told her mom that she would try harder the next year to raise more money for the charity.

A month later, Rachel was critically injured in a car accident. On July 23, 2011, she was taken off life support. She died soon after.

When the news about Rachel's story and her birthday wish spread, people all around the world began to donate money in her name. Some gave \$9, some \$19, some more. A month later, 30,000 people had given more than \$1.2 million. Because of Rachel Beckwith, 60,000 people in more than 100 villages now have clean water to drink.

In her honor, one village put up a sign that reads, "Rachel's great dream, kindness, and vision of a better world will live with and among us forever." Clearly, one person, even a child, can make a difference.

#### Architecture The Parthenon

Architecture, like painting, literature, and other forms of art, reflects the ideals of the people who build it. The Parthenon is the best example of ancient Greek architecture. The structure, created between 447 B.C.E. and 432 B.C.E., tells us a lot about the Greek way of thinking.

In Greece, balance and order were important principles<sup>1</sup>. The Greeks believed that everything around them happened for a reason. They wanted to find out this reason and discover the order of the world around them. Their buildings were beautiful, but they do not overflow with frivolity<sup>2</sup> or emotion. Instead, Greek buildings define order.

Columns are one hallmark<sup>3</sup> of classical structure that we associate with Greece and Rome. The Parthenon was built with eight columns on the front and 17 on each side. The building is symmetrical and balanced. Mathematical principles make the design stable. Almost the entire structure is made of marble.

#### Architecture The Duomo

One building, more than any other, marks the arrival of the Renaissance Europe. Did you know that "naissance" means "birth" in French and that the naissance was the rebirth of classical learning in Italy? Art and architecture ok off during the Renaissance. Many new ideas influenced design. The iomo, with its grand dome, is a perfect example of new ideas and innovation.

Work on the Duomo cathedral, in Florence, Italy, actually started before Renaissance, in 1296. But the building took 140 years to complete. The ague<sup>2</sup> and many wars prevented construction from continuing on the building planned. By 1420, the building was almost finished, but there was one rious problem. The plans for the building called for a huge cupola, or dome—

#### The Influence of the Arch

The lasting influence of ancient Rome is apparent in many areas of our contemporary society. Sophisticated elements of law, engineering, literature, philosophy, architecture, and art can all be traced back to the Roman Empire. But perhaps one of the most lasting contributions from Roman civilization is something we see nearly every day: the Roman arch.

An arch is a curved structure designed to support or strengthen a building. Arches are traditionally made of stone, brick, or concrete; some modern arches are made of steel or laminated wood. The wedge-shaped blocks that form the sides of an arch are called voussoirs, and the top center stone, called the keystone, is the last block to be inserted. During construction, the arch is supported from below before the keystone is put in. The curve of an arch may take different shapes, but it is often a rounded or pointed semicircle.

## Endangered koalas affected by forest clearing in Queensland

In Queensland, Australia, the laws over cutting down trees were made less strict. As a result, new maps show that about 325 square miles of important koala forests have been destroyed. Two years ago, the koala, Australia's national icon, was listed as endangered.

The koala's homeland made up about 14 percent of all land cleared between 2013 and 2015. This is alarming, according to the conservationist groups the World Wildlife Fund and the Australian Koala Foundation.

#### Conservationist Groups Are Shocked

Deborah Tabart runs the Australian Koala Foundation. She said that the loss of that much land was "shocking given the recent statement that koalas are functionally extinct in various parts of Queensland."

Tabart asked how this could have been allowed when the koala was listed as endangered by the government in 2012. She thinks the federal government should have voted on the land clearing, instead of being passed quickly by the state government in Queensland.

World Wildlife Fund scientist Martin Taylor said they need to stop destroying the koala's home. Otherwise, there is no hope of saving Queensland's koalas.

#### Bill To Be Discussed By Parliament

A Queensland government bill will be discussed by parliament very soon. The bill would restore the controls on land clearing that were undone by the former Liberal National government. The Liberal National Party is the right-wing party in Queensland.

The government argues that land clearing reforms have been very important. They stopped pollution from running off into the Great Barrier Reef. The change convinced the international organization UNESCO to keep the natural wonder off its "in danger" list last year.

The proposed reforms have provoked strong opposition from the rural lobby AgForce. However, AgForce is not a political party, but a group in Queensland that attempts to persuade officials to make and vote for laws that benefit farmers. Other political parties oppose the bill as well. They include the Liberal National Party and two representatives from the smaller Katter Party. They are expected to vote against the bill.

Peter Wellington is an independent member of parliament, meaning he does not belong to any major Australian political party. His vote might decide whether the bill passes or not. Wellington was supposed to meet Greenpeace representatives before the parliamentary meeting began to accept a petition in favor of restoring controls against clearing. Almost 24,000 Queenslanders have signed the petition.

Earlier, about 200 people rallied outside parliament in favor of the laws.

#### Landowners Should Be Held Accountable

The Queensland law society has condemned part of the bill. The bill would not require landowners to provide proof that they did not unlawfully clear land. The current Queensland state government thinks this lets landowners off too lightly.

Last week, the government's environment department stopped clearing on a north Queensland property. They wanted to study how the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act has affected the Great Barrier Reef. The act was passed to protect the country's plants and animals.

One Queensland senator, Ian MacDonald, raised concerns about the federal government. He does not want it interfering in permits already granted by the state government.

#### Koala Homeland Being Cleared For Cattle Pasture

The mapping of the clearing of koala homeland is the result of joint work by the World Wildlife Fund and the Australian Koala Foundation. They compared state government surveys showing land use with the Australian Koala Foundation's koala population maps. The maps show that 91 percent of clearing was for cattle pasture.

About 180 square miles were cleared between 2014 and 2015, which is up from the 140 square miles cleared the year before.

The single largest amount of clearing took place in western Queensland. At 45 square miles, it was nearly double the amount cleared in the next-highest local government area.

There was also significant clearing of koala homeland in other rural areas. Almost all of the areas lie west of the Great Dividing Range, Australia's largest mountain range.

Clearing forests in Queensland has more than tripled since 2010. Between 2009 and 2010, 300 square miles were cleared. Between 2014 and 2015, 1,140 square miles of forests were cut down.

In Queensland, Australia, the government loosened some of its rules about cutting down trees. Many of the cleared forests were home to koalas. The koala has almost died out in Queensland.

Martin Taylor is a scientist. He said the koala's home forests need to be protected. If not, the nation's koalas cannot be saved.

#### Laws To Stop Cutting Down Trees

The Queensland parliament might pass a law to stop cutting down forests. Then it will not be so easy for people to chop down trees. In Australia, parliament makes the laws.

The government wants to stop too many people from cutting down trees. The forests help to protect the Great Barrier Reef. The reef is home to some of the world's most beautiful fish. Many people visit the reef. The government wants them to keep visiting.

Some people do not want the law to pass. They work for farmers who want the land for cattle. They will vote against it.

Many people in Queensland do want the new law. Almost 24,000 Queensland citizens signed a letter. The letter says the new law is needed. About 200 people stood outside parliament. They wanted to show support for the law.

Some people think the rules are not strong enough. Landowners will not have to show proof that they did not cut down forests. Some people think this lets them get away with it.

#### Lots Of Koala Homeland Is Gone

Many forests were cut down in the country. Almost all were west of the Great Dividing Range. The Great Dividing Range is Australia's largest mountain.

The World Wildlife Fund and the Australian Koala Foundation are working together to save the koala. They showed how much koala homeland has been lost. Much more land is being cleared now than just five years ago.



#### What?

Here are some of the talking points for a conversation between teachers and middle-school students about new vocabulary in complex texts:

- \* "One of your goals as middle schoolers is to understand that any new text likely has words that you haven't seen before."
- "This is a text from one of the sample assessments for the new state test. This text might look like it is hard and it may even be on the first read. But I've studied the text and I know that all of you know most of the words. Even most of the words that you don't know (point to rusty and stunt) can be figured out with the word skills you have."
- "Also remember that words that are capitalized inside sentences are usually names. The strategy with names is to do the best you can, knowing that names are often pronounced in unusual ways because they may come from different languages. In this case, the person's last name is one that you can figure out with your knowledge of words (demonstrate with Ear hart)."
- "That leaves two words that are multisyllabic in the text and that you might not be able to read (point to exhibition and aviation). I want you to read this paragraph and see if you can figure out these words."



# 2. Chunk texts & set goals

#### Canada Day

On July 4th, the people of the United States celebrate their independence with parades and fireworks. On July 1st, the people of Canada <sup>25</sup> celebrate their own independence with parades and fireworks. On this day, called Canada Day, Canadians celebrate the day their national government was established.

Like the <sup>50</sup> United States, Canada began as a group of British colonies. Unlike the United States, however, Canada did not have a war to gain its independence <sup>75</sup> from Great Britain.

Instead, on July 1, 1867, the British North America Act gave the Canadian colonies the right to form their own national government. Canada was the first country to gain its independence from Great Britain in this way. Since then, more than 50 other former colonies have gained their independence from Great Britain in a similar way.



#### **Mexican Independence Day**

Mexico's national celebration marks the beginning of its war for independence. During the night of September 15, 1810, Father Hidalgo rang the <sup>25</sup>church bell in the village of Dolores. When the people of Dolores gathered in the plaza, Father Hidalgo made a speech that encouraged the people <sup>50</sup> to fight for their independence. The speech ended with these words: "Mexicans, long live Mexico!" This call began Mexico's war of independence against Spain.

To celebrate their independence, Mexicans gather in plazas on the night of September 15th to hear the cry, "Mexicans, long live" Mexico!" In Mexico City, the Mexican president gives this cry and rings the bell that Father Hidalgo rang in Dolores. People then spend the next day celebrating their independence with parades and fireworks.



## Independence Day in the Philippines

In the summer of 1898, the Spanish, who had ruled the Philippine Islands for hundreds of years, were defeated in 25 a war. The country that had won the war—the United States—then took over governing the Philippines.

For almost 50 years, the United States <sup>50</sup> guided the government of the Philippines. However, on July 4, 1946, the Philippine Islands became an independent nation.

Although the Philippine Islands gained its independence <sup>75</sup> from the United States on July 4th, the people of the Philippines decided to celebrate their independence on June 12th. That is because the national <sup>100</sup> flag of the Philippine Islands was first flown on June 12, 1898. This is the day that the people of the Philippines mark as the day when their country's independence really began.<sup>132</sup>



#### Freedom Day

In most countries, the national holiday celebrates the country's independence from the rule of another nation. Until recently, South Africa had a national<sup>25</sup> holiday of this kind. This holiday recognized South Africa's independence from Great Britain, which it gained in 1961.

The independence from Great Britain, however, did on t mean that all South Africans were free. The laws of South Africa favored white people. Black people had few rights, could live only in certain places, and could not vote in national elections. Finally, on April 27, 1994, South Africa held its first national election in which all people could vote.

South Africans now celebrate April 27th as their national holiday, not the day their country became independent of Great Britain. Freedom Day celebrates the day all South Africans gained their rights.<sup>133</sup>



#### **Bastille Day**

By 1789, many French citizens had become unhappy with their monarch, Louis XVI. France had been a monarchy, or a government ruled by 25 a king, for several hundred years. However, the people wanted to replace their monarchy with a government that would be fair to all citizens.

King 50 Louis XVI had put citizens who disagreed with him into a prison called the Bastille. For many French citizens, the Bastille was a symbol of 75 what was wrong with France.

On July 14, 1789, an angry mob stormed the Bastille and freed its prisoners. Soon after, the people overthrew the monarchy and established a form of government called a republic. The republic gave French citizens their rights. Today, the French celebrate July 14th, Bastille Day, as the day their republic was born.






